However, we also found that just 22% of adults in England have heard of CPRE and, if they have, they're not aware of all we do. It's clear we need to make people more aware of our work, attract more support and volunteers – and increase our impact even further.

We need to give equal emphasis to the work we do to promote, enhance and of course, protect the countryside. Our new strategic aims - to 'Connect people and countryside', 'Promote rural life' and 'Empower communities' will help us do that.

As you will have seen above, we've also developed a really eye-catching new look, inspired by the colours and shapes of our countryside and will start to refer to the organisation as 'CPRE, the countryside charity'





# A MANIFESTO FOR THE NEXT GOVERNMENT



CPRE believes that everyone has the right to enjoy a countryside that promotes a healthier economy and a happier community.

CPRE have therefore issued a manifesto for the next government, identifying four key areas in which action needs to be taken to help the countryside thrive. We want to see the next government:

- Promote climate policies that will implement measures to reach net-zero emissions by 2045 at the very latest;
- 2. Improve access to green spaces for everyone, particularly for children and those from disadvantaged communities who do not currently have access;
- Support a well-resourced planning system that empowers communities and promotes development that responds to their needs; and
- 4. Ensure the specific challenges faced by rural communities are addressed through meaningful investment in the rural economy.

We want to see sustainable rural communities, supported by investment from business and government, where residents' voices are heard in decision-making and local needs are met.

### ENVIRONMENT AWARDS 2019

There were three winners of the CPRE Environment Award for 2019, Amcotts, Broughton, and Low Burnham. They all received their awards and special plaque at the annual presentation evening, held in Messingham on 2 October.

Low Burnham and Broughton won awards for their efforts to involve the community in improving their environment.



The 'Burnham Bloomers' group was set up for community planting throughout the village and did a brilliant job, with the village being award the top prize (small village category) in the Best Kept Village competition.



Broughton in Bloom have worked extremely hard in the past year and have made a real difference in their town and deserved every congratulation in receiving their award,

In Amcotts, the Butterfly Project which also won an award, brought generations of villagers together with an Easter Parade and a



lovely butterfly garden in the grounds of the church. There was also a butterfly cascade, a butterfly bench (inset) and decorated pebbles in the churchyard.

#### **ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING AND TALK OCTOBER 2019**



Dr Kevin Leahy with Branch Chair David Rose and Committee Member Arthur Franks CPRE Northern Lincolnshire held their Annual General Meeting on Saturday 19 October 14.00 at the Buttercross, Brigg.

Before the AGM, CPRE hosted a talk by Dr Kevin Leahy FSA, MCIfA.

Dr Leahy, a well-known local celebrity and former archaeologist at the North Lincolnshire Museum has written a number of books including 'The Anglo-Saxon Kingdom of Lindsey' and he demonstrated his expertise in an entertaining talk entitled 'The Lost Kingdom – Anglo-Saxon Lindsey.'

He explained that Lindsey 'The Anglo-Saxon Kingdom of Lindsey' in the north of Lincolnshire was once independent with its own king. Archaeological and historical research has revealed this long-forgotten kingdom and shown its importance.

After the talk Dr Leahy answered questions and signed copies of his book 'The Anglo-Saxon Kingdom of Lindsey'
